
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<u>Presidents Report – Campbell</u> Jamieson

NZ National Superkart Championships and Grand Prix race report.

Our club was represented by David Cox and Nick Isaac in the KZ2 class of the NZ Superkart Championships and Grand Prix at Hampton Downs on the 25th of November.

Dave's been racing in the superkart series all year and had a series win under his belt leading up to the event. Nick, on the other hand, hadn't road raced since winning the national class title back in 2016. Preferring to do the prokart series this year instead. Running the vortex engine against the rest of

the field with their TM's would be interesting and we were looking forward to the challenge.

As was the case with our club champs, the weather was average, with a wet practise day on the Saturday and a mixture of wet and dry racing on Sunday.

The practise day was cut short due to a major car crash on the front straight, which took quite a while to sort out, meaning we got limited testing completed. We ended up losing 2 complete sessions which was up to an hour in track time. Although frustrating, everyone was in the same boat, so we just had to work with what we'd learned earlier in the day and rely on experience to make the best setup decisions we could for Sunday.

The tuning run went well in the wet conditions on Sunday with Nick the fastest of the KZ₂ karts by a healthy margin of 2.5 seconds around the 2.7km circuit. So far it was all going to plan. Then came the 12 minute qualifying session.....we were sitting on the dummy grid when Nicks' rain light failed....cue mad panic stations as Logan, Steve and Nick tried to fault find and rectify the issue. We finally got out onto the track with most of the session already completed. The pressure was on to punch out a fast lap in a small amount of time.

So it was straight out the gate on brand new wets to try and scrub them in and get them gripped up on a single warm up lap to do 1, maybe 2 flying laps to post a time. Luckily, we were able to rise to the challenge and we qualified on pole by 1.3 seconds with Dave managing a very respectable 5th. With our blood pressure and heart rates slowly dropping, we were hopeful that would be our one and only drama for the day. The rain light fault was diagnosed as a faulty cell in the battery. Dave was kind enough to lend us a spare battery and we were back in business.

Race 1 was wet again, with Nick able to run away early and build a manageable gap, before backing the pace off to conserve tyres. An easy win which eased the nerves a bit further. The weather had started to change and it was likely we'd be racing on a dry track at some stage, even though we were quite happy in the wet conditions, and to be honest, would have preferred it to stay wet, with the way the kart was hooked up. We knew there was more speed in the engine but we were being conservative with the jetting while we could afford to be.

Race 2 was on a dry track as suspected, and the competition started to heat up. We knew everyone, especially Prokart regulars Andrew Hunt and Regan Hall would be harder to beat on a dry track. Hunt got off the line well and took the early lead in the race. There was some good drafting and race craft on show, with a few lead changes early in the race, but we managed to eek out a gap towards the end of the race to take win number 2

It was evident from the revs we were pulling at the end of the straight that we needed to take a tooth off the rear axle in the dry conditions. The vortex was literally running out of breath, sitting at almost 15000rpm at 175km/hr so



Logan and Steve made the necessary sprocket changes to the kart and we hit the track for race 3. A win in this race would seal the title with a race to spare, so we were eager to get it done and celebrate early. Regan Hall was right on the pace now and we had a good battle with him, with numerous lead changes throughout the early stages once again. It was clear that the gearing change we'd made would be the right one, as we had the legs to run past the others at the top of the hill and got over the 180km/hr mark in the process. As we entered the final sweeper before the finish straight, Hall dived up the inside to take the lead. We weren't worried at all though and had a little chuckle under the helmet as we tucked in behind Hall, got the draft up the hill and pulled out to pass him for the win and to take 1NZ with a heat to spare! Lady luck was on our side though because the chain broke on the warm-down lap! We couldn't care less at that point though and had a laugh with the boys after we got back to the pits.

The Grand Prix was wet again, we had another good race, built an early lead before pulling back on the pace. We took an easy win by a margin of 11 seconds.

David Cox managed to secure 6th place overall for the event. He didn't have the pace he would have liked but no doubt, he learnt a bit more and will continue to improve.

A huge thanks to Steve and Logan Boyde for giving up their weekend to come and crew for me. It makes life so much easier when you have an experienced and able pit crew to make changes for you. It really

does take the pressure off, so thank you again guys, you're awesome! Ben also did a great job of limiting everyones calorie intake by eating **ALL** of the chocolate brownies Donna had baked! I guess we'll be taking a bit of lead off Bens kart soon! I'd also like to thank Simon Wilcox for letting me borrow his fairing and to David Cox for helping us out with a spare battery for the rain light. Also thanks to Maurice and Kane for supplying a spare engine just in case we needed it, and for all of their ongoing support. The vortex RKZ engine ran like a swiss watch and pulled like a train against the worked TM's, even with a very safe tune, and my tony kart chassis was hooked up all weekend with minimal changes needed as usual.

I also need to thank my very understanding wife Rebecca. She never gives me grief when I spend hours upon hours in the shed getting karts prepped, rebuilding engines and everything else that goes with doing everything you can leading up to an event, to be successful.

That's 2 years in a row now that our club members have taken out the KZ2 class at the nationals, with Logan winning last year when I was on his pit-crew. Hopefully that Taranaki teamwork trend continues into the future.














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Do you have a young person bugging you to try karting?
